




MOTORCYCLE TOURS

ABOUT CAMBRIDGE/ GUERNSEY COUNTY, OHIO



The crown jewel of the county is the abundance of recreational opportunities. Hunting, fishing, camping and golfing are centerpieces for the region. Ohio's largest state park, Salt Fork, and the state's third largest lake, Seneca Lake, are found within Guernsey County. Did we also mention that The Wilds, a 9,000-acre one-of-a-kind conservations facility, is also located here for seasonal safari tours?

National attention is gained annually as visitors flock to enjoy the Dickens Victorian Village and the Official Paul Bunyan Show, not to mention numerous other special events - such as Ohio's only outdoor Passion play, the Living Word Outdoor Drama.

A Hopalong Cassidy statue, dedicated to our hometown boy, William Boyd, who portrayed the beloved cowboy, is located just off our quaint main street. Not far from town is the John & Annie Glenn Museum detailing the famed astronaut's life. And don't forget the historic National Road (Route 40) running through the heart of Guernsey County that features specialty shops, antiques, museums and glass factories.

For foodies, we offer a plethora of experiences, whether it's enjoying a glass of wine or a craft beer overlooking a breathtaking view of our Historic Downtown Cambridge, stopping by one of our sin-sational bakeries or eating at one of our many local diners and eateries, you will savor the taste of Ohio!

NATIONAL ROAD TOUR

- Traveling east on I-70, exit 164 at Norwich, ride past the National Road/Zane Grey Museum, through New Concord, Downtown Cambridge, Old Washington, Middlebourne and Fairview.
- Ride the road that built the nation. Designated as an All-American, National Scenic Byway, the National Road runs through the very heart of Guernsey County.
- Follow the Old National Road tour signs on two lane paved and secondary roads. Guernsey County's rich cultural heritage is reflected in the historic architecture and agricultural scenery. Antique shops, locally operated restaurants, attractions and inns along Route 40 enhance the experience of traveling this historic highway.

The National Road offers adventure seekers today a great road trip just as it did two centuries ago. More than 30 key attractions and points of interest, specific to the history of the road, are located throughout the county. From the famous "S" bridges to stagecoach stops and tollgates, the route is lined with picture perfect sites. ROSCOE VILLAGE/AMISH COUNTRY TOUR

From Cambridge

- Take Route 40 west, the Old National Road / Wheeling Avenue (through Historic Downtown Cambridge) out of Cambridge approx. 8 miles to New Concord. Visit the John & Annie Glenn Museum on Main St. in New Concord for a unique walk through history!
- At the stoplight of Main St. and Highway 83, turn right (north). Be prepared for a wonderful rollercoaster style ride with great scenery!
- Approximately 8-10 miles north, turn left at the second road, (this keeps you on 83 toward Coshocton) and be prepared for a continuation of a great ride, but also watch carefully for large trucks headed south on this road!
- Intersecting Highway 16/36, turn right (east) to go into Coshocton, and visit Historic Roscoe Village. This ride is approximately 1 hour.
- Extend your trip by continuing north on 83, and head east on 62/39 into Sugarcreek-Amish Country. To return, either reverse your directions, or to take I-77, continue on 39 east out of Sugarcreek to Dover where you can jump south on to I-77 to return to Cambridge.



SENECA LAKE TOUR

From Cambridge and Interstate 77

- Heading south on I-77 (approx. 7 -10 miles south of the city of Cambridge)
- Take the Route 313 Seneca Lake (Buffalo) exit. At end of ramp, turn left onto Route 313, (get gas now if needed) and follow to Senecaville.
- At the 4-way stop in Senecaville, turn right onto Route 285.
- Turn left onto Route 566 (approx. 1-mile beyond the 4-waystop)
- Turn left onto Route 147 at end of Route 566 (watch for some occasional gravel). Follow Route 147. You will see the lake and ride over a bridge.
- From this point, continue onward and you will find Route 313 again, taking you around the lake and back around to Senecaville, Buffalo and I-77.
- While you are in the area, stop by the Seneca Lake Marina and rent a pontoon boat or enjoy a meal at Dockside Restaurant.

SALT FORK STATE PARK TOUR

From Downtown Cambridge

- Take Route 22 east from Wheeling Ave.
- Continue past Mosser Glass Factory (great free tour offered on weekdays) pass over I-77, through Center Township. Stop for a bite at 360 Burger.
- Continue several miles to Salt Fork State Park on the left side.

From Interstate 77


- Take Salt Fork exit #47, travel east through Center Township. Continue several miles to Salt Fork State Park.
- Cruise Salt Fork State Park to the marina and the Stone House Museum. Take a hike through the park on foot and stop by the Salt Fork Lodge for a great lunch or dinner. Camping and lodging are available in the largest state park in Ohio!



THE WILDS TOUR

From Cambridge

- Take Route 40 west, the Old National Road/ Wheeling Avenue, (through Historic Downtown Cambridge) out of Cambridge approx. 8 miles to New Concord. Visit the John & Annie Glenn Museum on Main St. in New Concord for a unique walk through history!
- At the stoplight of Main Street and Highway 83, turn left (south). Be prepared for a wonderful ride with great scenery, and if you need a quick lunch before you leave New Concord, stop in at Scott's Diner.
- Stay on 83 to Cumberland, turn west (right) on 146, also follow signs to The Wilds. It is well marked. Enjoy a wonderful day at The Wilds, one of the largest and most innovative wildlife conservation centers in the world
- To enjoy a more scenic return ride, leave The Wilds North on 284, head east on 313, cross under I-77. Head North on 285 which brings you back to either I-70 or Route 40, and head west back into Cambridge. (This makes a nice, round-about ride for about a 1-hour return trip.)
